



## PM Launches Health Card for Islamabad, AJK and GB

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif on Friday revived and extended the Prime Minister's Health Card programme to Islamabad Capital Territory, Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK) and Gilgit-Baltistan reaffirming the federal government's commitment to provide quality healthcare as a fundamental right to every citizen, regardless of social or economic status.

Addressing the launch ceremony, attended by Federal Minister for Health, Chief Minister Gilgit-Baltistan, federal ministers parliamentarians, senior officials including Secretary Health and the Chief Secretary AJK, the prime minister said the initiative marked another major step towards delivering healthcare facilities at people's doorsteps.

The prime minister congratulated Federal Health Minister Mustafa Kamal, Secretary Health, and their entire team on the launch, urging them to ensure transparent implementation through third-party monitoring so that treatment is provided at the right facilities and with the right standards. He expressed confidence that honest execution of the programme would not only serve the people but also earn reward in both this world and the hereafter.



## DC declares zero tolerance for child labour, human trafficking



### Residents of Gulbahar No. 3 Suffer due severe gas outages

PESHAWAR: The gas crisis in the densely populated area of Gulbahar No. 3 in Peshawar has intensified, leaving residents in severe distress. Citizens receive gas supply for only 2 to 3 hours in a 24-hour period, while the area remains completely without gas for the remaining 21 hours, severely disrupting daily life.

According to local residents, gas supply is completely suspended during school and office hours. From 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon, there is no gas at all. Gas is briefly restored at noon but is again shut off by 1:00 p.m., and remains unavailable until 8:00 p.m.

Residents say that due to the extremely limited gas supply, cooking meals, preparing breakfast for children, and managing other household activities have become nearly impossible, causing particular hardship for women, the elderly, and students.

Locals complain that despite repeatedly lodging complaints with the relevant departments, no action has been taken, leading to growing frustration and anxiety among the public.

The residents of Gulbahar No. 3 have strongly appealed to senior authorities, Sui Gas management, and the provincial government to take immediate notice, ensure uninterrupted gas supply, and relieve the area from this severe crisis, warning that failure to act may lead to public protest.

## Pakistan Hindkoan Movement concerned over deteriorating situation in KP

PESHAWAR: The Provincial President of the Pakistan Hindkoan Movement, Muhammad Akbar Sethi, has expressed grave concern over the deteriorating situation in

Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, stating that a province rich in resources has deliberately been turned into a hub of problems, making life unbearable for the common people.

In a strong and unequivocal statement, he severely criticized the current and former provincial governments, saying that there is no concept of good governance left in the province and that the rule of law has completely collapsed.

Muhammad Akbar Sethi said that a particular political party has given the province nothing over the past 13 years except sit-ins,

arson, and the politics of "March on Islamabad." When questioned about performance, attempts are made to take credit by naming old hospitals such as LRH and KTH, whereas in reality the public has received no relief whatsoever. He said that former Chief Minister Ali Amin Gandapur wasted his valuable time on protest politics, while the current Chief Minister is also busy with tours and symbolic activities instead of resolving the province's serious issues.

Expressing deep sorrow over rising unemployment, industrial shutdowns, and rampant inflation, the provincial president said that the price of a 20-kilogram bag of flour has reached Rs 3,000, while ghee has crossed Rs 600 per kilogram. Even before the arrival of Ramadan,

the "seasoning" of inflation has already begun. The flour crisis has reached alarming levels, yet the government remains a silent spectator.

Addressing the Chief Minister, he urged him to abandon futile political activities and focus on the oppressed people of the province.

He demanded that at least a 50 percent reduction in the prices of essential food items be ensured before Ramadan, bringing the price of a 20-kilogram bag of flour down to Rs 1,000 and ghee to Rs 300 per kilogram.

Akbar Sethi also called for the immediate formulation of an effective strategy to overcome the electricity and gas crises, warning that if timely measures are not taken, it will become impossible for poor people to preserve the joys of the holy month of Ramadan.



## Iran on Edge, Region Watches Closely

Iran is currently facing a tumultuous period that poses serious risks not just for itself, but for the entire region. What started as widespread protests against economic struggles in late December has spiraled into one of the most intense clashes between citizens and government forces we've seen in decades. Reports indicate that the death toll could be over 2,500, and the U.S. has dismissed claims that executions have come to a halt, even after President Donald Trump hinted at a pause in potential military strikes based on unverified information from Iranian officials.

In light of this grim situation, U.S. policymakers found them-

selves in a tough spot: should they take military action against Iran for its harsh crackdown on protesters, or should they hold back? A CNN report revealed that during a late-night meeting, senior national security officials discussed the possibility of limited military strikes after Trump was shown disturbing footage of past executions and informed about the impending execution of a young protester named Erfan Soltani. The thought of such an execution heightened Trump's worries about how the regime might react. However, the following day, the administration claimed that executions had supposedly stopped—a statement that hasn't been independently verified but seemed to ease the immediate threat of intervention. Trump referred to this as "good news," even as U.S. military assets were already being moved closer to the region.

This situation underscores the complex moral and strategic challenges surrounding Iran's crisis. From a humanitarian perspective, no government should ignore state violence against its own citizens. Yet, the potential for external military intervention—especially in a region already fraught with instability—is a concern that Pakistan and its neighbors are acutely

aware of. Islamabad has consistently urged for restraint and for all conflicts to be resolved through dialogue in line with international law, stressing its opposition to any outside interference in Iran's internal matters.

Regional powers have been watching this developing situation with concern and, in some cases, active engagement. Reports suggest that Gulf states, including Saudi Arabia, Qatar, and Oman, have pushed diplomatic de-escalation, wary of the wider consequences of open conflict.

For Pakistan, the implications are particularly sensitive. Islamabad shares a long border with Iran and deep cultural, historical, and economic ties, and it has made clear that its territory and airspace will not be used for hostile action against Tehran. The Foreign Office reiterated this stance.

Pakistan's diplomatic posture underscores a broader principle: regional disputes should be settled without military intervention. This is not a neutral refusal to acknowledge suffering within Iran; rather, it reflects a conviction that external use of force often multiplies suffering and destabilisation. At the United Nations, Pakistan's representative

stressed that threats of force would only push all parties further from negotiated solutions and greater humanitarian harm.

What is at stake in Iran today is both moral and geopolitical. Citizens are risking their lives for economic dignity, civil liberties and political freedom. At the same time, the international community is being tested on its willingness to defend human rights without triggering broader conflict. For Pakistan, the preference for diplomacy and peace resonates with national interests in regional stability. Any spillover—whether through conflict, refugee flows, or economic shockwaves—would have profound effects.

The events unfolding across Iran are a reminder that in a deeply interconnected world, internal crises have external consequences. Regional actors must tread carefully, balancing support for human rights with a commitment to de-escalation. In the current climate, Pakistan's call for restraint, dialogue, and respect for international obligations is not only principled but pragmatic. While Iran's internal situation remains fragile and uncertain, any slide toward regional confrontation would carry costs that no neighbouring country is in a position to bear.

## How the law still enables Palestinian dispossession

In the flood of commentary on Gaza, displacement and Israel's expanding settlement enterprise, one fundamental truth is often obscured: the Nakba did not end in 1948. It continues, and the law has been one of its most powerful instruments.

That is the central argument of *Stolen Nation: The Right to Reparation of Palestinian Refugees*, a deeply researched and compelling new book by Dr Lena El-Malak. Rather than treating Palestinian dispossession as a tragic historical episode, El-Malak shows how it has been sustained and normalised through legal systems that convert forced displacement into permanent, state-sanctioned ownership. El-Malak is a commercial technology and data-privacy attorney and an independent expert in international and refugee law. Before entering private practice, she worked as a legal and development consultant in the Middle East, including with the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees in Amman. She also writes as a descendant of Palestinian refugees—a perspective that gives the book both analytical depth and moral urgency. "I discovered over the

years that the Nakba is ongoing," she writes, reflecting on her encounters with refugee camps and the enduring trauma of displacement.

One of the book's great strengths is its refusal to treat land loss as symbolic or abstract. El-Malak traces how Palestinian land ownership was systematically undermined through successive legal regimes—from Ottoman land classifications to British Mandate policies, and finally through Israeli legislation after 1948. She shows how ambiguous land categories and incomplete registration systems were later weaponised to justify sweeping confiscations. At the centre of this legal architecture lies Israel's 1950 Absentees' Property Law, which transferred the homes, farms, orchards and businesses of millions of Palestinians to state-controlled bodies. This was not a neutral administrative measure; it was the legal consolidation of mass displacement. Crucially, El-Malak argues that this confiscation is not a closed chapter. Under international law, it constitutes a continuing wrongful act. Because the violation continues, so too does the obligation to remedy it—through restitution of property and compensation for losses. United Nations General Assembly Resolution 194, she reminds readers, affirms these rights clearly. They are not aspirational claims or bargaining positions; they are legal entitlements.

This is not nostalgia. It is the law. What makes the book especially urgent is its relevance to the present moment. Two-thirds of Gaza's population are refugees or descendants of refugees from 1948.

El-Malak completed the book during this period of devastation. She notes that refugee camps in the West Bank, including Jenin and Nablus, have also been subjected to repeated assaults. The pattern is unmistakable: displacement followed by destruction, justified and entrenched through law. As Lex Takkenberg, a leading authority on Palestinian refugee law, observes in the book's foreword, El-Malak's analysis is directly relevant to the unprecedent property losses Palestinians are experiencing today. Seen through this lens, reparations are not a matter for some distant "post-conflict" future. They are a present-day demand arising from ongoing harm. El-Malak is unsparing in her critique of the so-called peace process. From Madrid to Oslo to Camp David and Taba, Palestinian refugee rights were steadily stripped of their legal character and reframed as "final status issues" to be negotiated—and often traded away.

This shift had profound consequences. Binding rights were treated as obstacles rather than foundations for peace. Law was replaced by power. The result was not compromise, but erasure—and negotiations that collapsed precisely because they ignored justice. Any future political process that once again sidelines refugee reparations, El-Malak argues, is destined to repeat these failures.

El-Malak does not romanticise international law. She recognises that legal systems have often

served imperial and settler-colonial projects. Citing legal scholar Noura Erakat, she notes that law can only serve an emancipatory function when it is wielded deliberately in the service of a political movement.

Abandoning law altogether, however, would mean surrendering the terrain to those who have long used it to entrench inequality. What the book offers instead is a framework for reclaiming law—transforming refugee rights from moral appeals into enforceable demands in international forums, negotiations and global advocacy.

The significance of El-Malak's work lies in how it situates Gaza's destruction within a century-long continuum of dispossession. By grounding Palestinian claims in established legal principles—restitution, compensation and state responsibility—she makes clear that accountability is not optional.

If the international community is serious about ending cycles of displacement and violence, reparations cannot be deferred indefinitely. They must be the starting point.

El-Malak's book is not only a work of legal scholarship; it is a reminder that justice requires naming the crime, exposing its mechanisms and refusing to accept dispossession as destiny. For readers seeking to understand Palestine not only as a humanitarian crisis but as a legal and moral reckoning, the book offers clarity—and a challenge that can no longer be ignored.

## Back from the brink

At the same time, it would be intellectually dishonest to dismiss all security and economic concerns as mere dog-whistling. States do have a legitimate right to ensure that immigration systems are not exploited by individuals involved in suspicious or unlawful activities. Ignoring these risks altogether would be reckless. The challenge lies in precision, not prohibition. Populism may win elections, but policy built on broad-brush exclusions rarely stands the test of time.

## Back from the brink

Better sense has prevailed in Iran as protesters have taken a backseat amid a much lenient response from the government. The breakthrough was evident as the Islamic Republic stayed away from executing alleged spies. That came as a thaw with the US, which had threatened to use force against Iran as a mark of 'retaliation', after having stirred the protesters to stay put on the streets, awaiting its blatant meddling.

Tehran, on its part, heaved a sigh of relief as millions demonstrated in favour of the government in many major cities, pushing back the dissenting voices to a footnote. Last but not least, President Pezeshkian's damage control measures to beef up the economy by working on an obliterating rial and providing cash relief to the masses had struck the right chords. Also, Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi came up with a timely intervention assuring Western capitals that "no hangings" will take place, and reportedly sought help from the allies to broker an understanding with the US. That gesture worked wonders, and a trigger-happy Trump was surprisingly seen taking a back foot, hoping that Iran would uphold 'human rights'.

Tehran was quite successful in assuring its domestic audience that the 'uprising' is synthetic and is backed by Israeli agents holed up at home and abroad. That push-back in narrative has worked for the time being, and streets have reportedly gone quiet. Iran, however, has a responsibility to shoulder and that is to work closely with dissenting voices for an inclusive administration, and one that discovers new vistas for opening up with the outside world and addressing the pestering economic woes.

Washington, meanwhile, must desist from interfering in Iranian affairs. Its modus operandi in Iraq, Afghanistan, Libya, Somalia, Syria and Lebanon has left behind miserable memories of death and destruction. It was neither able to build those respective nations nor uplift their social strata. This thaw comes as an opportunity in disaster for both the US and Iran to get talking and end the decades of mistrust. The regime change mantra is untenable.

Education is often discussed as a development need—a tool to reduce poverty, improve employment, and raise living standards. While this view is correct, it is dangerously incomplete. Education is not merely a social service or a welfare investment; it is a strategic instrument that determines the survival, strength, and sovereignty of a nation. Countries that understand this truth rise quietly but decisively, while those that ignore it remain trapped in cycles of dependency, instability, and decline.

At its core, education shapes the human mind, and the human mind shapes history. Roads, bridges, and buildings can be imported or reconstructed after destruction, but a nation's thinking—its capacity to analyze, innovate, and lead—cannot

be borrowed. This is why the most powerful countries in the world do not treat education as charity; they treat it as national security. Their classrooms are extensions of their strategy rooms, and their universities are laboratories of future power.

A nation without quality education may still function, but it cannot compete. It produces followers instead of leaders, consumers instead of creators, and emotions instead of solutions. When education is weak, decision-making becomes impulsive, public discourse becomes shallow, and society becomes vulnerable to manipulation. Rumors overpower reason, slogans replace substance, and extremism finds fertile ground. In such an environment, even sincere patriotism can be misdirected and exploited.

Education also defines the moral architecture of a society. It teaches not only how to earn a living, but how to live together. Through education, citizens learn tolerance, responsibility, critical thinking, and respect for law. Without these values, development becomes hollow. You may have economic growth, but no social cohesion; technology, but no ethics; power, but no wisdom. History is full of examples where nations advanced materially but collapsed morally—and education was either neglected or reduced to rote learning.

From a strategic perspective, education is the most cost-effective defense system a country can build. An educated population strengthens institutions, improves governance, and reduces corruption. It creates citizens who question authority respectfully, demand accountability, and contribute constructively. No army, no surveillance system, and no foreign alliance can protect a nation as effectively as an aware and educated public.

In the modern world, wars are no longer fought only on borders; they are fought in economies, media, cyberspace, and narratives. Education equips a nation to fight these silent wars. It produces economists who protect financial sovereignty, engineers who secure digital infrastructure, journalists who defend truth, and diplomats who understand global complexity. Without education, a country becomes strategically blind—reacting to events rather than shaping them.

Yet, the tragedy in many developing nations is that education is treated as an expense, not an investment. Budgets are allocated reluctantly, teachers are undertrained and underpaid, curricula are outdated, and critical thinking is discouraged. Degrees multiply, but understanding shrinks. This approach creates a dangerous illusion of progress—educated on paper,

but unprepared in reality.

True education does not mean producing examination-passing machines; it means nurturing problem-solvers. It does not mean memorization; it means comprehension. It does not mean blind obedience; it means informed discipline. A strategically designed education system aligns with national goals, cultural values, and future challenges. It asks a simple but powerful question: What kind of citizen do we want to produce in the next twenty years?

For countries like Pakistan, where youth make up a majority of the population, education is not just strategic—it is existential. ## Putin Calls for Multipolar World, Stronger UN Role

MOSCOW: Russian President Vladimir Putin has emphasized the importance of international cooperation, dialogue, and respect for international law as essential foundations for global stability, security, and sustainable development.

Speaking at the ceremony for presenting letters of credence by newly appointed ambassadors in Moscow on January 15, President Putin said that peace does not emerge on its own but must be built through consistent effort, responsibility, and deliberate choices.

He noted that the current international environment is deteriorating, with old conflicts intensifying and new centers of tension emerging.

The Russian president criticized unilateral actions that replace diplomacy and compromise, stating that some states

rely on the "might-makes-right" principle to impose their will on others. He said dozens of countries are suffering from viola-

President Putin stressed that respect for international law and the development of a fair, multipolar world order offer a

policy that considers both national interests and global development trends.

He also underscored Russia's support for strengthening the central role of the United Nations in global affairs and reiterated that security must be comprehensive, equal, and indivisible, warning that ensuring security for some at the expense of others leads to instability.

Referring to the Ukraine crisis, President Putin said it was the result of years of ignoring Russia's legitimate security concerns and the expansion of NATO towards Russia's borders, contrary to earlier assurances.

He concluded by stating that Russia remains open to building equal and constructive relations with all international partners in the interest of global prosperity, well-being, and development.

12. In case detailed rate analysis submitted with the bids is, in view of the Procuring Entity, not convincing, the Head of the Procuring Entity may declare such bid as non-responsive without any forfeiture of bid securities and record reasons thereof.
13. The procuring entity may offer the contract to next lowest bidder after due diligence in the context of financial difference between such two bids or may advertise procurement opportunity afresh.
14. The call deposits i.e. bid security for the work / contract must be prepared after publishing of NIT and before the closing time of the bid.
15. Work order will be issued subject to availability of funds. The time for completion of scheme shall be as per work order. The contractor or his representative can be present at time of opening of electronic bids opening.
